Keynote Speakers

Jonathan Martinis

Supported Decision-Making: Protecting Rights, Ensuring Choices

Jonathan Martinis is the Senior Director for Law and Policy for the Burton Blatt Institute at Syracuse University. **Jonathan has over 20 years' experience** representing people with disabilities to protect their legal and human rights, including precedent-setting cases securing access to critical community-based services.

In 2013, Jonathan represented Margaret “Jenny” Hatch in the “Justice for Jenny” case—the first to hold that a person has the right to use supported decision-making to make her own life choices instead of being subjected to a permanent, plenary guardianship. Since then, Jonathan has spoken to and trained thousands of people, families, attorneys, advocates, judges, teachers, health care workers, and other professionals across the country about **everyone’s right to make choices and direct their own lives.**



U. S. Army SPC Donald Zielenski, Retired



Don Zielenski joined the Army in 2008 at 19 years of age and was trained as a Cavalry Scout in Fort Knox, Kentucky. His first duty station was Camp Hovey in South Korea in 2009. He then became part of the 44th Cavalry in Fort Riley, Kansas. In February 2011, Don deployed to Afghanistan. In August 2011, Don was the gunner in a vehicle that was hit by an 82mm projectile, causing him to hit his head on the turret and take some shrapnel. He was the recipient of a Purple Heart for these injuries.

In November 2014, Don and other troops were part of a dismounted patrol, clearing houses, when one of his fellow soldiers stepped on a pressure plate, setting off an IED, which

brought the roof down on top of them. Don’s injuries included multiple facial fractures, a fractured skull, the loss of sight and hearing on the left side, a punctured spleen, collapsed lungs, shrapnel wounds in the right arm, torn meniscus’s in both knees and a severe traumatic brain injury. Don was in a coma for two weeks. He was 22-years-old.

Through his journey of recovery, Don has endured 16 surgeries and years of therapy and rehabilitation. A major part of his skull has been replaced by titanium, and plastic surgery has restored his handsome features on the outside. As with many TBI survivors, both military and civilian, he lives with a tremendous amount of physical pain and mental trauma on a daily basis.

Medically retired from the Army, Don is a student at the University of Mississippi. He has much gratitude for his miraculous recovery and gives back by telling his story to others to give hope to people who need it.

Supported Decision-Making: An Alternative to Guardianship and Conservatorship

Over reliance on formal systems of substituted decision-making prevent inclusion, self-determination and community integration, in violation of the Americans with Disabilities Act and Olmstead.
